Ambush was carried out by Kilgefin and Kilbride Companies, Batt. III. South Roscommon Brigade.

For many days before the Ambush, Scouts were posted on the various roads in Batt. III.areak to watch enemy movements.

The Scouts on the road from Roscommon to Boyle and Strokestown reported that several Lorries of Black and Tans and Military travelled each day from Roscommon to Boyle or Strokestown, of from Boyle and Strokes

-town towards Roscommon.

It was decided to ambush the Crown Forces at place marked A. on the attached sketch, at which the main body, or attacking party took up posite

The country in that district is very open, and as there was no definit.

information as to where the lorries would come from, it was necessary to send a "Squad to the points B.C. andD.

The Officer or N.C.O. in charge of each of "Squado" was under orders to block his road immediately he heard the sound of rifle fire at point A. This was to prevent any other lorry passing towards the point of attack.

Some of the Officers were placing a cart in a position so that it could be pushed out before the expected lorries, and the main body was preparing positions, when the sound of a Crossley tender was heard coming from Roscommon and travelling very fast.

The O/C. (Bat Madden) gave orders to "TakeCover" and immediately after, the "Fire"order was given, and instantly all weapons responded to the Order.

The Driver of the Crossley escaped, and succeeded in getting his tender out of range of the attacking party, but not before 2.R.I.C. Sergeants and 3 Constables were killed, and 3 others so seriously wounded that they were unfit for further duty.

The tender travelled at a wreckless rate towards point B. where the squad war working hard but before the road was rendered impassable the Crossley drove through the wall accross the road and got away. The Squad at this point opened fire on the Crossley which was now very

On hearing the sound of the guns the men at C. and D. carried out the orders given them and consequently held up for a considerable time a lorry of Military travelling from Strokestown towards Roscommon, and also another lorry travellingafter the 'attacked' lorry.

Owing to the very open country in this district we believe the men at points B.C. and D. did their bit, equally as well as the party at A. and were exposed to as much danger.
