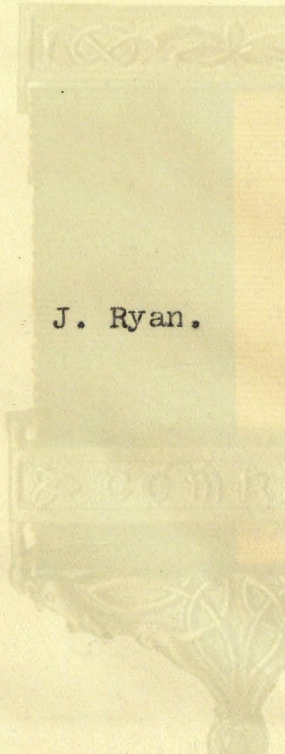
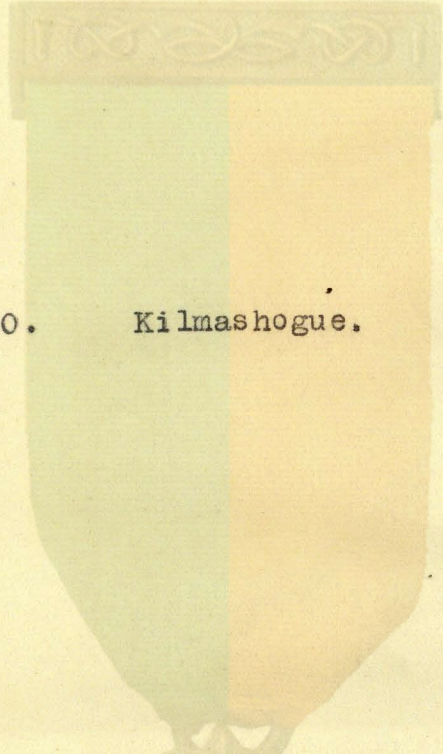

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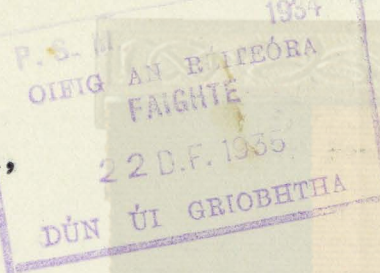

Military Service Pensions Act, 1934

In connection with the above I wish to claim on behalf of the 5th Battalion (Engineers) Dublin Brigade, that this Unit be treated as a special Unit for the purposes of Service Pensions. If the ordinary Active Service tests for Infantry Units were applied to the 5th Battalion it would result in an injustice to the men for the following reasons:-

This Battalion was organised on the basis of men being picked from the Infantry Battalions who had a special knowledge viz. Engineers, Electricians, Carpenters, etc. At first a Company was formed consisting of a section from each of the four Battalions. Eventually a Battalion was formed limited to a Company of twenty-five picked men from each of the four Infantry Battalions i.e. one hundred men in all. In due course this number was extended and no limit was placed to the number of men in this Battalion.

These men had to undergo a long period of instruction in the handling of explosives, detonators, calculations of amount of explosives for a particular job, etc., and in studying maps and plans of telephone cables, manholes, etc., throughout the city of Dublin with a view to the isolation of particular areas. Consequently during this period of instruction men were withdrawn from the ordinary Infantry activities which normally would constitute active service.

In addition to the above, the nature of their training precluded them, as a rule, from taking part in any military operations as their services were required only when a large military operation was being performed, viz., attempts at derailing troop trains, or isolation of large areas, as in the case of the burning of the Custom House. Had these men been allowed to continue in their Infantry Battalions they would probably have partaken in the engagements of their respective Units.

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In determining what was Active Service in the 5th Battalion, it may be argued that these men were not, generally speaking, called upon to take part in ambushes, etc., they did not run as great a risk as the Infantry. It should be pointed out that from the point of view of the enemy activities that every time during the period of instruction which continued up to the beginning of the Civil War that Sections went to test, and to familiarise themselves in the use of explosives or to be shown a Manhole and what it contained, in the streets of Dublin, they ran just as great as the man on ambush duty. Further, every time that any work had to be carried out either for training or for an actual military operation, raids had to be made for the various tools required, viz., sledge-hammers, Bolt-cutters, acetylene plants, etc.

Further, these men were recognised by Headquarters as being in a separate category, when it was found necessary, for instruction purposes at any rate, to place them under a separate Department of the I.R.A. under the Director of Engineering.

Also, Officers of the 5th Battalion were not elected by the men as in the case of Other Battalions but were appointed by Headquarters as it was recognised that special qualifications were required.

In these circumstances I shall be obliged if the Board will be good enough to give this matter special consideration so as to ensure that due recognition will be given to the men who performed this special work.

Record of Activities of 5th Bn.
Dublin Brigade 1919-1921.

As a result of my interview with the Advisory Committee it has occurred to me that a document containing the above would be of assistance to the Advisory Committee in its consideration of applications. I accordingly enclose a copy of such a record the original of which is in my possession.

In order that the Committee may properly appreciate the value of this record I give here the method of its compilation.

The Battalion Council decided that in order to assist claimants to fill up their forms it would be necessary that each Company should prepare a record of its activities, together with a record of the officers of the unit and the period during which each officer held his appointment. These Company records on completion were forwarded to the Battalion Council for scrutiny and approval, and the enclosed is the finally approved record.

Whilst this record was primarily compiled for the purpose stated above, it had the additional value that it prevented a man making an inaccurate claim or a false claim, i.e. presuming he sought the assistance of his Company officers in preparing his claim.

It will be noted that this record does not cover the activities of the unit from which this Battalion originated - "K" Coy. or G.H.Q. Engineering unit.

I would like to take the opportunity of stressing the fact that the activities of the units were for a long time confined to organisation, training, and procurement of equipment. Training had to be mainly theoretical as it was out of the question to give practical demonstrations in the Dublin area of the theory taught.


This restriction of activities was directly due to the specific orders of the Director of Engineering who was not prepared to risk the loss (through death or imprisonment) of comparatively highly trained men by permitting them to engage in ambushes etc. He held the view that at any time a crisis might arise which might demand wholesale demolition in the Dublin area and he looked upon this unit as a "special reserve" (if I may use the expression) to be maintained intact for such

an emergency. His view was that this was the main reason for the existence of the unit; and that if he agreed to the unit engaging in activities normal to the other four infantry Battalions there would be no justification for its existence as a separate unit, and its personnel should be absorbed into the other Battalions.

I stress this point because it has appeared to me that the operation of this policy might now have an adverse influence on the claims of men of the unit to "active" service. Their cases are not on a par with those of men of other units who were never selected for an operation. In the case of the 5th Bn. there existed a definite prohibition against engaging in operations other than those of a purely engineering character. I think this is a factor which should have an important bearing upon the claims of personnel of the 5th Battalion.
